Monday, June 26

What's New in the Deaf–Dementia Connection–Dr. Jaime Wilson

Seminole Ballroom 8:00-9:30 AM

Dr. Wilson will kick off the DSA Conference with a spectacular Keynote Presentation

that provides essential updates to his wildly



popular and educational presentation on the serious disease that is dementia. Dr. Wilson will further detail the deaf-dementia connection and share new approaches to protect ourselves against cognitive decline to live happy, healthy, and vibrant lives during our Golden Years.

The Art of Mime: Sign to Mime—James "JJ" Jones

East 1&2 9:45-10:30 AM

JJ will cover the history of mime and his journey as a mime artist. He will also show mime techniques and movements.



Benefits Equal Dollars: How to Afford Your Doctors and Medications—Sharon Reich

East 4&5 9:45-10:30 AM

You need to take a new medication, but it costs too much to fill. You should go for diagnostic testing, but the co-pays



are too expensive. Every day, people choose not to fill prescriptions or attend medical

appointments because they don't have enough money to pay for both health care and living expenses. This presentation will focus on the Qualified Medicare Beneficiary (QMB) program, a Medicare savings program that that reduces medication and copay expenses for people already on Medicare. Learn what benefits are provided by QMB and how to qualify when you are over the financial limit.

That's Not What I Meant!-W. Ross III

Interpreting from ASL into spoken English is very challenging. People who can hear do not understand the genuine meaning of terms that



have a lot of meaning to Deaf people – words or phrases like generational Deafness, oral education, and residential schools. Research shows that some words are shared by Deaf and hearing people, but they do not have shared meaning; these terms are Deafcentric. When those words are interpreted literally, as they often are, the literal interpretation causes meaning to be lost or misunderstood which in turn creates greater distance between Deaf and hearing people.

Overview & Use of a Certified Deaf Interpreter: Addressing the Wh-Questions—Reinaldo Vega

East 4&5 10:45-11:30 AM

This workshop will introduce and give participants an opportunity to walk through a general overview of the concept



of working with and the profession of a Certified Deaf Interpreter.

Travel Through Time with T-Mobile Accessibility—Alana Beal

West 4&5 9:45-11:30 AM

Explore communication tools from the past and examine how they have changed over time. Participants will be challenged to think



about whether advancement in telecommunications technology equals advancement in civil rights and communication access. Presenters will lead a lively discussion on how the rise of technology has had a large impact on the Deaf community, including education, cultural behaviors and communication access. Learn how to recognize and protect yourself from government impersonation scams, lottery scams, tech support scams,

through time with T-Mobile Accessibility! Want to Receive Live VRS Calls and Texts on the Same Phone Number?— Norman Williams

and phishing emails/text messages. Zip

East 1&2 1:30-2:30 PM

Learn how to set up of a single phone number that allows hearing people to contact you either via text or live VRS calls (not voice



mails). No more missed texts to your VP number and voice calls to your text number.

Do You Remember When....? Elder Deaf LGBTQA+ stories—Bridget Klein & Robert Rourke

East 4&5 1:30-2:30 PM

Gays and lesbians don't grow up immersed in gay history; it is something they must search for. We will



share some historical turning points that have impacted Deaf LGBTQA+ intersectional experiences. We hope to help elder LGBTQA+ remember their experiences and



share those with us. We will provide tips on preservation of stories by scanning pictures and conversations via VHS tape to digital video. In this way, we will engage in the creation of a collective history.

Secure 2.0: How will this new law affect your retirement account?—Stephanie Summers & Danny Lacey

West 1&2 1:30-2:30 PM

A new law was passed in December 2022 referred to as SECURE Act 2.0. It made sweeping changes to retirement accounts. This workshop outlines the majority of these changes and how they may impact you and your retirement. This information applies to those who are still working and also to





those that are already retired but still have retirement accounts such as IRAs, 401(k), 403(b), TSP, etc. No changes apply to pensions.

Choices in Senior Living and Homecare—Chuck Crush

West 4&5 1:30-2:30 PM

This session will address housing options and different levels of medical care for seniors, including assisted living, nursing homes, rest



homes and hospice care options.

Estate Planning with Probate Avoidance—Todd Elliott

West 1&2 2:45-3:45 PM

This workshop focuses on probate avoidance techniques that people can undertake in their estate planning endeavors. Learn how



you can ensure that your loved ones get the assets and monies they need from your estate.

Hands and Flippers for Marine Conservation: Sea Turtle Research & ASL Guided Programs—Jennifer Reilly

East 4&5 2:45-3:45 PM

ASL Guided Programs are the first of their kind for Loggerhead Marinelife Center (LMC), in South Florida. These began in 2018 and



include private facility tours of the facility, school field trips, night turtle walks, sunrise nest excavations and internships. The goal of these programs is to provide Deaf communities the opportunity to learn how to become stewards in marine conservation, using sea turtles as a focal point.
